Mini Plenary #1 - Challenges in Treating Youth for SUDs – The Cannabis Dilemma Location: Meeting Room 1 & 2

The current macro environment is sending perhaps the most confusing mixed messages to our youth about substance use than ever before. On one hand, NIDA funded studies demonstrate that the impact of drugs on the developing brain for youth presents tremendous risk and that the concentrations-"strength" of marijuana sampled off the street is the strongest ever. Then on the other hand, state governments are legalizing marijuana not only for medicinal purposes, but recreational. The end result is a generation of parents that have become complacent with drug use by their kids and young people who feel more empowered than ever before to use drugs. In the midst of this attitudinal shift in society, parents are not seeking help until their children's use is at a far more progressed state. Unfortunately, when parents are seeking help, they are resistant, ambivalent at best in signing on to the appropriate level of care for the appropriate length of time. The end result is a larger number of youth who are at increased risk to use pills and opioids that may otherwise have been treated sooner with a better prognosis. This mini plenary is targeting discussion, strategies and recommendations that may ameliorate the current condition surrounding youth substance use and connections to treatment.

Mini Plenary #4 – Marijuana Policy, Marijuana Facts and Myths, in New York and Beyond Location: Meeting Room 7 & 8

Harnessing more than two decades of experience in policy, Dr. Sabet combines humor with science, wit with clarity, and pragmatism with inspiration in this lively presentation. This plenary talk will discuss the perils of Big Pot -- the big tobacco of our time, as Dr. Kevin Sabet will argue. Dr. Sabet will go through the latest developments over the battle to legalize marijuana, and will review the latest science about the drug. Dr. Sabet's presentation is based on his book "Reefer Sanity: Seven Great Myths About Marijuana." In his presentation he will provide an overview of the current drug policy trends in the United States, and debunk some of the most cited myths about marijuana use, for instance: marijuana is harmless and non-addictive, and legalization will solve the government's budgetary problems. Dr. Sabet makes the claim that our greatest concern should be the inevitable rise of a second Big Tobacco industry, this time marketing marijuana to our children and youth. He will refer to the already arising problems in Colorado and Washington state as examples. His presentation concludes with an overview of our policy options, describing a smarter, science-based approach to marijuana policy that neither legalizes marijuana nor demonizes its users. You will hear more about marijuana, and more about marijuana policy, the health effects of the drug, and the current political landscape in this presentation than you likely ever have.
