3:15 pm - 4:15 pm	Substance Abuse and Its Impact on Driving The abuse of illicit drugs places every person working in the public sector at risk. As drug use and abuse continues to be a major problem, drug-impaired driving is an issue of increasing public and governmental concern. Driving un- der the influence of drugs (DUID) is against the law in all 50 states. As legal marijuana spreads and the opioid epidemic rages on, the number of drugged drivers killed in car crashes is rising dramatically. Since recreational marijuana was legalized in Colorado, marijuana related traffic deaths increased 151% while all Colorado traffic deaths increased 35%. With a national opioid epidem- ic and states legalizing marijuana, NHTSA is making the drug-impaired-driving problem a top priority to ensure U.S. roads, communities and families are safe from impaired drivers. This workshop will provide valuable training to help identify legal, and illicit substances of abuse, to include the connection between drugs and impaired driving, traffic safety data, indicators of various drug use, what drugs look like, how drugs are used, create a better understanding of the effects illicit drug use has on users, and provides an understanding of how drug use affects all of us. <i>Presenter: Lynn Riemer, Founder and President, ACT on Drugs</i>

1:40pm – 2:45 pm	Taking a Trauma-Informed Approach to PreventionAs the nation's opioid crisis deepens and evolves, the number of children exposed to the trauma of living with one or more family members experiencing substance use disorders (SUDs) continues to grow. Traumatic expe- riences such as early exposure to substance misuse and violence, and adversity in the home, have been identified as major risk factors for early substance use initiation, substance misuse, and SUD in adulthood. To address these and related factors, practitioners must not only select and implement pro- grams designed to increase support for children and youth from SUDs-affected families, but also pay close attention to how these programs are delivered (e.g., by staff trained in trauma response, in spaces that are safe and welcoming, in ways that support relationship-building). This workshop will sup- port these efforts by identifying steps prevention organizations can take to en- sure that their staff and organizations use trauma-informed practices and poli- cies, opportunities to adapt existing prevention strategies to better address the needs of children and families experiencing trauma, and examples of specific trauma-informed programs.

	According to the CDC, more than 72,000 Americans died from drug overdoses in 2017, including illicit drugs and prescription opioidsnearly double in a decade. Yet almost exclusively, the entire national conversation has been about increasing access to Medication Assisted Treatment and Naloxone. These are necessary, albeit, insufficient to truly address the crisis.			
	What is the role of prevention and coalitions in this crisis? Why is it so difficult to engage the broader stakeholder of our communities with the urgency this crisis calls for? How can prevention and coalition leaders more effectively engage their communities in solving this challenge.			
	The purpose of this workshop is to assist coalition leaders, social workers, counselors, prevention and addiction professionals, and other clinical personnel in identifying and providing effective prevention solutions for addiction. During this workshop attendees will be introduced to many proven strategies to prevent opioid misuse. Prevention strategies are critical to working upstream to address the issue of prescription drug misuse. States, communities, and families can intervene to reduce inappropriate access to prescription drugs, thus significantly reducing the impact of the opioid crisis.
